We continue to have lowest council tax in Nottinghamshire

Our Council Tax level will again be the lowest in Nottinghamshire and remain in the lowest 25% in the country following approval at our Full Council meeting on March 7.

Rushcliff

Building on cost-of-living support last year where 60 per cent of residents did not receive a Council Tax increase, a Band D property will increase just £3.93 for the 12 months from April 2024 or 2.55%.

Our 2024/2025 budget is in a time of significant pressures and real terms decreases in funding but is in conjunction with us continuing to embrace opportunities that support the economic growth and development in the Borough and maintain discretionary services valued by residents.

We are currently debt-free and therefore not impacted by significant increases in interest rates on borrowing faced by some authorities.

Our Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Finance. Transformation and Governance Cllr Davinder Virdi said: "RBC is in a relatively stable financial position compared to many councils. This is down to the culmination of hard work by both Councillors and

officers to keep Council Tax the lowest in Nottinghamshire, further assisting residents with cost-of-living increases.

"We believe to have one of best financial positions of any Council in the country but remain realistic and not triumphalist, appreciative of the stark challenges many of our peers are facing and that we also share.

"We still have to take difficult decisions but we are maintaining high levels of service and not cutting back on them. The budget supports the most vulnerable such as the homeless and balancing other objectives such as supporting climate change and improving the environment."

"There are still many potential economic and financial challenges ahead but we know where we are, where we are going to and how we will get there with continued astute and well-informed decision making that continues to deliver high quality services."

You need **photo ID** to vote at this May's elections

Residents will be heading to the polls on Thursday May 2 to take part in Combined County Authority Mayoral and Police and Crime Commissioner elections.

At these elections you will need to bring photo ID to be able to vote at a polling station. Those using a postal vote do not need to provide ID.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote at a polling station?

Accepted photo ID include:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional license)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

For more information on which forms of photo ID will be accepted, visit <u>electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID</u> or call their helpline on **0800 328 0280**.

If you have a form of accepted ID that is out of date but still looks like you, you can still use it to vote.

What if I don't have an accepted form of photo ID?

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC).

You can apply for this online at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to our electoral services team. If you need any help applying or want to request a paper application form contact us by emailing <u>elections@rushcliffe.gov.uk</u> or calling 0115 981 9911.

The deadline to apply for a VAC for use at these elections is 5pm on **Wednesday April 24**, but you should apply as soon as possible in case we need to check any details with you.

You need to be <u>registered to vote</u> before you can apply for the certificate.

How do I register to vote?

To vote in these elections, you must be registered to vote by 11.59pm on **Tuesday April 16**.

If you've never registered, have recently moved to a different address, or changed your name, register to vote online at gov.uk/register-to-vote.

You can also apply by completing a paper application form.

If you need help registering to vote, or want to request a paper application form, please contact us by emailing <u>elections@rushcliffe.gov.uk</u> or calling 0115 981 9911.



Changes to voting by post and proxy

Voters can now apply online to vote by post and for some types of proxy vote. For further information and to apply, please visit **gov.uk/apply-postal-vote** to apply to vote by post or please visit **gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote** to apply to vote by proxy.

The deadline for applying for a postal vote is 5pm on **Wednesday April 17**, and the deadline to apply for a proxy to vote on your behalf is 5pm on **Wednesday April 24**.

VOTER ID

Combined County Authority Mayoral and Police and Crime Commissioner elections take place on 2 May 2024. You will need to bring photo ID to vote.

Cotgrave and Keyworth leisure centres welcome £4.1m investment in refurbishments and energy upgrades

We are investing £4.1m in refurbishments and energy efficient upgrades over the next three years at Cotgrave Leisure Centre and Keyworth Leisure Centre.

The refurbishment programme, subject to planning approval, will see the decarbonisation of the leisure centre in Cotgrave making it carbon neutral, followed by building repairs and upgrades to the site in Keyworth.

We received £1.2m from the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero's Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme to help reduce the carbon emissions at Cotgrave Leisure Centre.

The funding will enable the replacement of old boilers and outdated, inefficient heating and hot water systems with new modern, low carbon Air Source Heat Pumps.

Heat pump units will use electricity from renewable sources to efficiently draw heat from the air and transfer it into the swimming pool and surrounding areas, resulting in 250% to 300% energy efficiency.

Refurbishments at the Cotgrave site will also include:

 A new Changing Places toilet enabling users with mobility challenges to change more easily

- An improved toilet and reception layout
- Widening corridors
- An improved dedicated spin studio
- Larger modern dance studio with improved lighting and sound systems
- Updated and improved layout to the poolside changing rooms.

The Changing Places toilet is courtesy of a £50,000 capital grant investment secured from the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities.

Keyworth Leisure Centre will see essential repairs to the roof and a facelift of toilets, changing room, gym and reception.

Our Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Leisure and Wellbeing, ICT and Member Development Cllr Jonathan Wheeler said: *"We're continuing to invest in our leisure centres across the Borough to enhance the quality of facilities for residents and further help reduce carbon emissions.*

"Having significantly invested in West Bridgford and Bingham leisure facilities recently, it's exciting that we can welcome this further £4.1m funding and help the Council move closer to its zero-carbon agenda by making leisure centres more efficient to run."

"After a really positive start, I'm pleased we're now in the third edition of the book which includes even more useful resources and information to help people look after themselves, meet new people and connect with nature.

Focus on **quality and standards** for new developments in Rushcliffe

We are preparing a new Design Code to set out quality and standard rules for new developments and we recently invited residents, local interest groups, design professionals and developers to have their say on the strengths and weaknesses of their area and what could be done to improve places in future.

The Design Code will cover a range of topics including:

- How new and existing developments should be connected, for example through footpaths and roads
- The position of new buildings and their size and scale
- The design of public spaces

• Landscape around new buildings such as green spaces and tree planting

Designers, architects and developers will have to follow the Design Code when bringing forward new developments in the Borough.

The code will provide more certainty for Rushcliffe's communities about the design of new development, raise design standards and support the Council in determining planning applications.

Crime dropping and better use of CCTV helping us

"Hello again from the Rushcliffe Neighbourhood Policing team.

Some crime related updates to start. We continue to see a decrease in theft of motor vehicles following some good arrests and plenty of preventative work issuing faraday bags.

Shop theft is down from the peak last summer, with some superb partnership working in West Bridgford in particular, better use of CCTV and criminal behaviour orders.

Bike thefts are lower than last year, however I'll be looking to work with local businesses around some of the hot spots we have for such incidents.

I'm aware of a small number of shed burglaries in the area around West Bridgford, and despite this number being low, I'd encourage residents to report anything suspicious which could be linked to those offences.

You may have read of the recent cannabis grow located on Loughborough Road. A male was detained, charged and remanded with drugs offences there, and enquires are on-going with the landlord and other parties too.

This was only possible due to information from the public, so thank you to those who got in touch.

Significant progress is being made to improving CCTV in Bingham using Police and Crime Commissioner funding, we're also working with the Council around youth club provision in East Leake, as well as innovative new Beat Surgeries being held in secondary schools too, so keep your eyes peeled for news on those in your local area.

Life-saving defibrillator project for sports venues in Rushcliffe funded by UKSPF

Sixteen sports venues across Rushcliffe have been supported as part of our project that is raising awareness, providing training and improving access to lifesaving defibrillators.

The Safe Hearts in Sport initiative, supported by Shared Prosperity Funding from the UK Government is equipping venues, sports clubs and their coaches and volunteers, with the tools and resources to ensure if anyone is faced with a cardiac emergency, they are prepared and know what to do.

Through the project, we are working with partners to provide new defibrillators at sites that don't currently have one, outdoor cabinets to make existing defibrillators more accessible and other equipment such as new batteries, paediatric pads and prep kits.

The venues are registering with the national defibrillator network The Circuit, which provides NHS ambulance services with vital information about defibrillators across the UK.

Having your defibrillator registered can be the difference in those crucial moments after a cardiac arrest so they can be accessed quickly to help save lives.

It's vital that anyone who owns or looks after a defibrillator should register the device with the network at <u>thecircuit.uk</u>

RBC's Deputy Leader and Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Business and Growth Cllr Abby Brennan said: *"Through our UKSPF allocation we're pleased to support this Safe Hearts in Sports initiative enhancing the safety of our residents and the many people who play sport.*

"In recent years there have been several local incidences of sudden cardiac arrest affecting the sporting community. Raising awareness and equipping our sporting venues with accessible defibrillators could save a life if someone has a cardiac arrest."

Over £60,000 investment at Boundary Road Park in West Bridgford!

West Bridgford's popular Boundary Road Play area has reopened to the public after receiving £63,000 investment in refurbishments.

The play area has welcomed a new climbing wall, zip wire, accessible seesaw, swing sets, benches and the refurbishment of springers and other toddler and junior play features and improvements to the safety surface.

The works included replacing a large earth mound with more accessible equipment whilst incorporating natural play elements.

It's part of our wider investment in parks, with Adbolton Lane play park's £80,000 makeover completed last year and Greythorn Drive and Rushcliffe Country Park set to receive further improvements this spring.

To mark the opening of the play area, we were joined by Proludic Ltd and local children from Heymann Primary School to celebrate with a ribbon cutting at the park.

Our Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Leisure and Wellbeing, ICT and Member Development Cllr Jonathan Wheeler said: "Community play facilities such as these are so important to our residents and visitors, so we are delighted to provide these vital upgrades to the park, improving them for the long term and fit for the future.

"The re-development of Boundary Road sees accessible and inclusive equipment introduced so all children can enjoy our play facilities, which also incorporate natural play elements.

"It was great to welcome Year 2 children from Heymann Primary School to the park and seeing them enjoy the newly refurbished facilities!

"This builds on our previous work in 2021 to improve the site with £70,000 investment on the bike track, teen shelter, gate entrance and additional tree planting to enhance the green space ensuring that the play features sit in harmony with the natural environment." **Oaks**

Visitors can enjoy a great day out at Rushcliffe Country Park with its popular café, visitors' centre and more!

Coffee and Cake by the lake hosts a wide selection of teas, coffees, cakes and hot and cold light bites including healthy option foods and soups, paninis, toasted sandwiches, pasta pots and ice cream.

Park goers will also spot a new outdoor shelter next to the café, perfect for relaxing with your hot drink or picnic.

Our recent investments at the park also include an outdoor shelter, visitor centre, bookable meeting room, improved play area, electric vehicle charging points, and pathway restoration work.

We've also recently welcomed new and refurbished compost toilets and shade sails to further enhance its visitor experience.

The new sails located near the children's play area and skatepark are designed for all-weather, year-round use, providing essential shade during the summer months and protection from rain.

Two of the shelters were funded by a resident who frequently visited over the years and made a donation to the park in their will.

The park's conference room boasts integrated guest wi-fi, digital display screen and polycom device to enable video conferencing and a fully adaptable meeting space up to 30 people.

Alongside our investments, our park rangers and the Friends of Rushcliffe Country Park group work hard all year round to maintain, reserve and protect the popular site.

In addition to their hedge laying, they planted 30 semi-mature native trees in the Kite Field in December last year which is helping to combat losses from ash dieback and create wildlife corridors by linking habitats together.

Traditional hedge laying at Rushcliffe Country Park continues to protect wildlife

Rushcliffe Country Park has again welcomed a traditional hedge laying technique to help manage its hedgerows sustainably, helping to provide a valuable habitat and food source for wildlife.

Park rangers and Friends of Rushcliffe Country Park (FoRCP) volunteers undertook the manual technique earlier this year which involves cutting the hedge tree thinly at the base and lying them on their side. It's an annual practice they've used for decades in certain places of the park.

New shoots are now arriving that will create a dense hedge and enhance local biodiversity and create a more manageable hedge compared with mechanical techniques.

Hedge laying has been used for hundreds of years but has been slowly dying out since WW2 due to the introduction of mechanical hedge cutting from tractors and readily available wire fencing.

Our Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Leisure and Wellbeing, ICT and Member Development Cllr Jonathan Wheeler said: *"We're proud to keep this traditional country hedge laying technique* at our park which helps to keep our hedges in a much better condition than mechanical flailing. "Hedgerows provide vital resources for mammals, birds, and insect species and contribute to carbon reduction and we have a strategic aim to increase the Borough's hedgerow network by 40% across the Borough by 2050.

"A big thank you to our park rangers and the FoRCP for working hard to keep this wonderful hedge laying tradition alive."

The FoRCP group meet every Wednesday from 9.30am to 2pm to help create and maintain habitats and conservation work, learn and share knowledge about wildlife and nature, and help improve the park and its facilities.

New floodlights installed at Keyworth Rugby Football Club with £30k UKSPF funding

We have allocated over £30,000 of UKSPF funding for floodlights enhancements at Keyworth Rugby Football Club enabling them to host a girls' rugby development programme and maximise club training opportunities during the winter months.

Supported by Shared Prosperity Funding from the UK Government, the improved lighting on the pitches and car park has meant the club on Willoughby Road in Widmerpool now has extended hours and increased use of the facilities through training and tournaments leading to further group bookings at the pavilion.

It is also now the proud home to the Notts Lincs Derbys Girls Developing Player Programme (DPP) at U16 level, and the U18s girls' training sessions.

DPP supports girls across the East Midlands on a development programme and is the first step to playing for England Rugby.

Our Deputy Leader and Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Business and Growth Cllr Abby Brennan and RBC ward member Cllr Rob Inglis met some of the girls and coaches from the DPP programme to take a look at the new facilities, installed late last year. "Keyworth Rugby Football Club has also seen an increased use of the pavilion and facilities by both club members and outside organisations.

"It's brilliant that the club is now hosting the Under 16 Girls' DPP, which is the first step on the girls' journey towards England elite level. It's an exciting programme and we're pleased they can train here in Rushcliffe, hugely assisted by this investment.

Roofer thanks NUH rehab staff who helped him to walk again

A roofer who fell 35ft and landed on concrete has thanked the Nottingham University Hospital (NUH) teams who nursed him back to health and taught him to walk again.



Simon Bell, 58, from Burton Joyce, was working on a roof in May 2023 when he fell from the two-storey building.

He suffered a brain injury, internal bleeding and damage to his internal organs, and had fractured his shoulder and broken all of his ribs on the right-hand side.

He said: "I was in intensive care at QMC for six weeks, and my body was in shutdown. I wasn't good – they had to remove my spleen, my liver and kidneys were damaged, and they kept pumping blood out of my lungs. I was in quite a mess."

After five weeks in Intensive Care and six weeks on the Major Trauma Ward at QMC, Simon was transferred to Linden Lodge at City Hospital to begin his rehabilitation with the specialist team consisting of nurses, physiotherapists, occupational therapists and psychologists.

In September, Simon was finally allowed to return home to his wife and daughter, but

it's been a big adjustment for them all, and there is still a long road to recovery with support through outpatient rehabilitation provided.

In the future, patients such as Simon will be able to receive intensive support at the National Rehabilitation Centre (NRC), currently being built here in the Borough on the Stanford Hall Rehabilitation Estate near Loughborough.

Both Simon and Jo said that the plans for the NRC will be a great step forward in rehabilitation facilities – especially having individual rooms and facilities to help with the transition home.

In addition, the NRC will have state-of-theart rehabilitation facilities, as well as space for families to spend time together, assisting and supporting their rehabilitation journey. Find out more about the NRC: nationalrehabilitationcentre.nhs.uk

Ask for Angela campaign's rural expansion

We recently joined members of Nottinghamshire Police and local business owners in a bid to raise further awareness of the Ask For Angela campaign in rural locations across the Borough.

It's a national scheme that helps anyone who is feeling vulnerable on a night out to get the support they need.

The scheme works by training staff in vulnerability management and what to do when someone Asks for Angela.

The trained member of staff will understand the person asking is in need of help and support and will be able to respond in an appropriate, discreet way.

They might call security, lead the person to a safe space, or help them leave the premises unnoticed.

It supports venues to keep their customers safe, which in turn improves perceptions of safety and patronage in the night time economy.

A recent YouGov survey on feelings of safety in the night time economy found that 49% of people and 63% of women

would be more likely to visit a venue that had measures in place to improve women's safety.

If you go to the bar of a participating establishment and Ask For 'Angela' the staff will know you need help getting out of a potentially difficult situation.

The project aims for the simple message to be used by anyone at anytime and may mean something simple like calling for a taxi to help a person leave a difficult situation or if required, contacting the Police for assistance on their behalf.

Our Portfolio Holder for Environment and Safety Cllr Rob Inglis and ward member Cllr Tina Combellack joined PC Paul Sanders and staff from The Unicorn's Head in Langar to share the message.

Cllr Inglis said: "The Ask for Angela campaign plays an important role in protecting anyone who feels unsafe when meeting socially and ensuring it is also available in rural outlets is essential."
